FROM THE PASTOR ---- REV. NATHANIEL ASPERGER

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ!

I sat and tried to write this article several times, I wrote several articles, all of them seemed like the wrong thing to write on this occasion.

So, let us start from the top.

I have been rather troubled this year with much that has happened. I have been someone to call or to reach out to when others have been troubled, saddened, hurt or struggling with something for much of my life. I suppose that is the pastoral presence of the Spirit on me in some form. Much of this year has been people around our state and country who I have been acquainted to, or had the privilege of calling them friends, reach out for prayers and guidance. In many of the conversations this year it has been things like, "I am burned out", worry, dread, anguish and fear. From migrants, LGBTQIa+ peoples, pastors, atheists, white, people of color, elderly, young and many people in-between. There is an overlying heaviness in people's whole lives, spiritual, mental and physical heaviness; in the form of anxiety, stress, health issues and questioning. Mental and physical health issues perhaps are the easiest to relate with, we all have something in ourselves that relates to those areas. The questioning, the spiritual side of things I want to consider for a few moments together.

There is a lot going on in our country, and our world. Shortly before sitting to write this article, Israel and the US, have attacked Iran. For many of us, this seems the start of a new cycle of wars in the middle east, like Desert Storm, 9/11, the war on terror, and many other operations and conflicts. The Russo-Ukrainian war continue, as does the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the Syrian civil war, the continent of Africa has a dozen or so conflicts ongoing, as well as Myanmar, Yemen, and Turkey. We have seen unprecedented storms like Helene and others in the Midwest leave peoples lives overturned, as well as the fires in the Palisades amongst others. The US is ever more divided over...well everything. Politically we are supercharged to fight either to defend one idea, or another.

The questions I have sat with others over, and even myself, are deep ones. Why is God allowing this? Why can people not see the hurt they are causing? Why are my family so bought into this cause? Why has this friend disowned me? There are many more, but I hope you get the idea. It would seem to me that the underlying question is where is love? Perhaps it does not seem like it, but I believe there is a question about genuine love in many of those questions. Why does God not love us enough to step in? Why are people willing not to love some people? Why is my family withholding love from me? Why does my friend no longer love me?

I have been chewed out, cursed at and downright told I am an idiot from people this year at an alarming rate. Often, I am advocating for civility, understanding and grace, from a place of love in those situations.

I want to assure you the Triune God loves us all in more ways than I can fathom. I cannot state that enough. It might not always feel like it, with blatant disregard for life, and hate in so many of the actions around the world today. John 3:16-17 says, "for God so loved the world that they sent their one and

only son to save it. They did not send him into the world to condemn it, but to save it through him". At times, we want a physical savior like the Jewish people did in Jesus' time. At times we want to give up freewill, to ask God to step in. In love, God maintains our freewill, though their Spirit might convict us strongly. The Savior came to save us in the long-game, the end of times and to step in would be to the destruction of some, which John says he did not come to do.

The actions and accounts of Jesus are always done in love. The teachings are all based in love and loving correction. The rest of the Second Testament of the Bible all lean on that teaching. I promise you, that in all that is going on in the world that the Word and action of God promise us they will love us forever. Even though it may not seem like it in the chaos of all our realities, the little mercies and the light of God persist in the hardest of times.

2 Thessalonians 3:3 says, "But the Lord is faithful; he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one." It might not be always in the ways we want it, but God faithfully loves us in all times. In the book of Jeremiah and Lamentations both, Jeremiah speaks of the promise of God, even when all hope for a life the Israelites wanted was gone, and they marched into exile in chains.

Wherever you are in your life, your health and your discipleship walk, know that God will always love you, even if it is a heavy and dark time. Know also that your pastor is here, and I am always willing to sit and listen, and to pray and offer what I can from the Spirit.

May the Lord bless you and Keep you till we meet again.

The committee would consist of 5 - 7 volunteers from the congregation who are passionate about environmental issues. Ideally, it would include a mix of ages and backgrounds, including at least one member of the Deacons and the Session to maintain alignment with church leadership.

As steward of God's creation, we are called to live responsibly and intentionally in our care for the environment. In recent years, growing environmental concerns--climate change, resource depletion, pollution-have prompted churches across the country to examine their ecological footprint. We believe our church has both the opportunity and the obligation to lead by example in this area.

HERE'S WHAT'S HAPPENING AT CTC?



At CTC we support many different Missions through "Special Offerings" including **One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost/Strengthening the Church, Peace & Global Witness/Neighbors in Need** and **Christmas Joy/Fund** as well as our "Missions of the Month" throughout the year.

PER CAPITA DONATIONS

As church members we are reminded annually that we must pay a per capita tax to our denomination. This money usually goes toward paying expenses at the higher level than our own immediate church. Since we are a two-denomination church (Presbyterian and United Church of Christ), we receive two bills for per capita. The denominations base the total per capita on the number of members that the church reports. Also, please bear in mind that since we are two denominations, all of our membership statistics that are submitted to the two denominations annually are divided in half. For instance, if we have 100 members, the report to each denomination will be 50 members. The Presbytery bill for us covers 50 members, so it is actually to our benefit. We also receive a bill for a lesser amount from UCC based on 50 members.

With this in mind, the Session has approved a request to be made to the members to pay \$30.00 per capita for 2025. Just a gentle reminder that the per capita is per member, not per household. So, if you have four people in your household that are members of Countryside Church, you are asked to pay for all four people a total of \$120.00. In order to defray the expense of the per capita, the Session is asking that members assist the church by paying their own per capita of \$30.00/member for 2025. We do not want to put a hardship on anyone, but these bills must be paid whether our treasury gets help from the members or not. There will be an envelope marked "per capita" in your box of contribution envelopes that you will be receiving in the next few weeks that you can use.

The Session appreciates your help in this matter.

SUMMER NURSERY CARE AND SUNDAY SCHOOL


