FROM THE PASTOR ---- REV. NATHANIEL ASPERGER

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ!

As we move through the year, there are continuous opportunities to reflect on what has happened. What has happened today, last week, back in January, etc. So many moments that seem to have passed all too quickly. I often find myself looking backwards, to discern where to go next.

In my doctoral program, we have a practice we are advised to do what's called, "going up on the mountain." The idea is that in your day, your month and year, that you intentionally take a bird's eye view of what is happening and why we are where we are. This is not so much a practice to look back and lament, or to regret, but to evaluate and come to terms with what is reality. In our lives, both outside and inside our community here at Countryside Trinity Church, this is a valuable practice to consider.

I have not been here very long in reality, and for much of the time I have been here I have been working to both see the past, and the future of our community of faith. It is easy to get caught up in some of the traditional concerns about a church. "We need more young people," We need to change this/that," "I like the way we did this ______." These are valid and common things across churches everywhere. However, I invite you to step a little higher in the mountain with me for a moment. We are a community of rich heritage, we come from many churches, many walks of life, across many churches. We are a multi-generational church, reflecting inner city, and rural peoples. Sometimes it is easy to see backwards where we were, and what we have done, and what we want. I would like us all to consider where we are today, before we look very far down the road.

To be clear, this practice or the invitation is not to say I have all the answers. On the contrary, I am still working to understand where we all have come from, and understand the history of Countryside, Warren Avenue, Washington Avenue, Grace, and all the other places that were on our journeys to here. The Session and I have been exploring our Mission, Hopes and Dreams since I came, as a way to have the conversation. The Elders of Countryside are spending time working to look down the road and see where we are today.

I would like for all of us who come to Countryside, to consider where we came from, and what the reality of where we are today is. The hope of all this is to better understand where we are going, and how to respond today. I could certainly preach on the political climate, I could certainly teach a class on theology, I could write a plan based on the brilliant professors I have had. However, I would like us to have a conversation together. I would like us to sit atop the mountain together and discern what the Spirit of the Triune God is showing us while looking at the path that brought us all to this day and place.

My door is always open for any thoughts and conversations. I have extended an invitation for help with a historical committee to look at our past. I would be grateful for your help in sitting up on the mountain, to collectively look around to see where Countryside Trinity Church is today, and where God is calling us all towards tomorrow.

Until we meet again, may the Lord bless you and keep you.

YOUR SESSION AT WORK

MINUTES TAKEN BY CAROL VAN ARSDALE, CLERK OF THE SESSION, JUNE 22, 2025

The Session meeting was opened with a prayer by Pastor and Moderator Nathaniel Asperger.

Minutes of Stated Session meeting of May 25, 2025, stand approved with corrections. Minutes from the Annual Congregational Meeting of January 19, 2025, were approved.

Deacons: Report: The Deacons have asked to form a "Green Committee" to look for ways that CTC can be more sustainable. They need to act now because they need to replace the plates, silverware, and cups in the kitchen currently. They would like to stop using Styrofoam and plastic if possible. The Session approved this committee formation.

Clerk's Report: The Registry is being brought up to date. The membership list has been cross-checked with the current Registry and former Registries from CTC and other churches that CTC members have migrated from.

Building and Grounds: The phone system is no longer working. The Building and Grounds committee will try to find the best solution. Currently calls into the building are being forwarded to Pastor Nathaniel's cell phone. The plan is to use a hot patch on the large holes in the parking lot, but it is too hot right now to complete the work. Parts for the water have been purchased.

Finance and Stewardship: A Financial review will be completed by the August Session Meeting.

Christian Outreach: Thank you notes were received from two of our monthly missions.

Personnel: A job description was approved for a Digital Media Manager and the Personnel committee was authorized to hire someone for the position.

Spiritual Life: We will return to passing the offering plate during the service beginning in July.

Nominating: No report

Pastor's Report: New members will be publicly recognized in July. The minister of Second Presbyterian Church has resigned effective July 1. Carol Van Arsdale has accepted a position on the Personnel committee to replace Mary Ann Parker.

Adjournment: Meeting adjourned with prayer from Pastor Nathaniel at 12:51. Next Session meeting August 17 following church. Genesis Sunday: September 7.

Florian "Floyd" E. Krzak was born in Saginaw, Michigan on March 29, 1928. The Lord called him home on July 5, 2025, at the age of 97. Floyd is survived by his wife Lois E. (Ranke) Krzak; three daughters, Karen Roth (late Ken Roth) of E. Lansing, Kristine Dillon of Saginaw, Jeanne (John) Wells of Troy; a son, John Kaye of Saginaw; a granddaughter, Chloe Wells; a brother, James Krzak (late Margaretta "Getty" Krzak) of Saginaw; a brother-in-law, Tom Bow of Saginaw and loving nieces and nephews.

He was the first-born child of Frank F. and Leona M. (Suchocki) Krzak. Floyd grew up on Saginaw's east side in a predominantly Polish neighborhood. He lived only streets away from aunts, uncles, and cousins, all with whom he had close and loving relationships. As a boy, he cherished his bicycle. It was his means of transportation and afforded him the opportunity to run errands for his cousins, ride to the bowling alley where he worked setting pins after school and on Saturday mornings, or ride across town in the summer to go swimming at the new pool in his community.

As a teenager he attended Arthur Hill Trade School. He learned to read blueprints and operate machine tools. The skills and knowledge he acquired helped prepare him to become a skilled tradesman.

At age 17, he joined the Navy and saw much of the South Pacific as a Seaman First Class. He served aboard 2 aircraft carriers, the USS Boxer and the USS Antietam.

As a young man, Floyd enjoyed racing his boat in races on the Saginaw River and flying a 2-seater Luscombe airplane.

Floyd learned a skilled trade as a machinist working for K C Engineering and Machine Company for 11 years. He left to begin work at General Motors, working there for over 38 years. Floyd was an avid union member and supporter, who very much enjoyed his work and the company of his coworkers.

In 1955 he married Lois Ranke. They raised three daughters and a son. Floyd enjoyed helping his neighbors, friends and those in need. He touched numerous lives with his efforts. Volunteering with Habitat for Humanity and donating over 30 gallons of blood in his lifetime were some of the ways Floyd was able to help others.

Upon retirement he and Lois enjoyed traveling in the U.S., especially visiting national parks. He maintained a lifelong love of airplanes and numerous times attended the largest air show in the world, held annually in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Floyd kept busy right into his 90s, building things for his house or working in his yard and garden. Those who knew him also knew he loved a cup of coffee and was always game for a second cup. He took great joy when he learned that in his early 80s, he was to become a grandfather. His only grandchild, Chloe Wells, was the apple of his eye and much loved by him. Floyd never hesitated to let his children and wife know how much he loved them. He trusted God and had a close walk with his Savior. He was a member of Countryside Trinity Church. Previously, Floyd had been a member of St. Helen Church in Saginaw for many years.

He was preceded in death by his parents and two sisters, Bernadine (Tom) Bow and Kathleen Krzak. Floyd and Lois also had a stillborn daughter, Susan.

At CTC we support many different Missions through "Special Offerings" including One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost/Strengthening the Church, Peace & Global Witness/Neighbors in Need and Christmas Joy/Fund as well as our "Missions of the Month" throughout the year.

PER CAPITA DONATIONS

As church members we are reminded annually that we must pay a per capita tax to our denomination. This money usually goes toward paying expenses at the higher level than our own immediate church. Since we are a two-denomination church (Presbyterian and United Church of Christ), we receive two bills for per capita. The denominations base the total per capita on the number of members that the church reports. Also, please bear in mind that since we are two denominations, all of our membership statistics that are submitted to the two denominations annually are divided in half. For instance, if we have 100 members, the report to each denomination will be 50 members. The Presbytery bill for us covers 50 members, so it is actually to our benefit. We also receive a bill for a lesser amount from UCC based on 50 members.

With this in mind, the Session has approved a request to be made to the members to pay \$30.00 per capita for 2025. Just a gentle reminder that the per capita is per member, not per household. So, if you have four people in your household that are members of Countryside Church, you are asked to pay for all four people a total of \$120.00. In order to defray the expense of the per capita, the Session is asking that members assist the church by paying their own per capita of \$30.00/member for 2025. We do not want to put a hardship on anyone, but these bills must be paid whether our treasury gets help from the members or not. There will be an envelope marked "per capita" in your box of contribution envelopes that you will be receiving in the next few weeks that you can use.

The Session appreciates your help in this matter.
