# Countryside Trinity Church

### FROM THE PASTOR ---- REV. NATHANIEL ASPERGER

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ!

I sometimes find myself sitting and reflecting on our world. Often it seems that one cannot look very far without getting inundated with negatives. Newsflashes, updates, constant squawking on the TV. (I do not like most news programs in case you were curious). The reality is that negativity sells, viewership and engagement is higher with negative news. It is where the money is, and you can see it in the number of negative news, edgy TV programs, and storylines that follow conflict almost without fail.

In my doctoral program we have been studying some new research about how negativity impacts our mental and spiritual selves. The general consensus was a 3:1 ratio, you need three positive things to happen, to cancel out one negative thing. That in itself seems sort of manageable, if you turned the news off or did not look at your phone, or changed the subject in a conversation after that one negative thing. Recently it was changed to a 5:1 ratio, so five positives to one negative. However, in the research an instructor shared is that the ratio is more realistically 7:1. You need seven good things to offset one negative...that makes things a bit more difficult. How can an individual manage to find enough positive things to offset the explosion of negatives in a day? Inflation, tariffs, government overreach, military control, wars, disease, endless legal cases being covered, debt, taxes, all the world politics, and that list does not necessarily include all the things happening around us in our communities.

The reality is that the negatives change how our brains function. Negativity on our TV's, screens and elsewhere release cortisol for instance, which is the body's primary stress hormone. The constant influx of cortisol from the barrage of negatives in our lives can affect the part of the brain responsible for fear, memory and executive functions. In short, it makes us anxious, irritable, negative, grumpy, and it can affect our ability to think.

In Japanese Culture, there is a practice of "1000 little thanks". There are different names for it depending on who you ask. The basic idea is that all throughout your day, you intentionally express your gratitude for every small thing. Not just the big moments, but every small thing. An example would be expressing your gratitude that you have a chair you like to sit in, or that your vehicle got you around without issue. This practice of "1000 little thanks" is a great exercise in gratitude, something that is an important part of the Christian faith. It is all over the Bible, Abraham, Noah, David, the Psalms, Romans, the Woman at the well, most of the pastoral letters, there is gratitude expressed from the Triune God, and the cloud of witnesses represented in the Word.

As we think about the chaos of the world, and as we think of the beauty around us despite the chaos, I invite you to try out this practice of Gratitude. If it seems a bit daunting, there is another great option that Andrea and I do daily, where we talk about the 3 things we are most grateful for in the day. These can be simple, they can be the biggest best things in your day. I use both practices,

working to highlight the little things throughout my day, and the 3 things that stand out at the end of the day. I invite you to give one or both of these things a try.

The reality for us as Christians, is that we have much to be thankful for. Our eternity is sealed in Jesus Christ. Our Peace and Hope come from the Lord. These are but a few of the "big" things that we receive as active participants in our faith. If we want to be Christ-like, if we are working to be different from the ways of the world, gratitude is a great place to look. I am sure we can all think of that person or group of people who stand out because they are always so, kind, helpful, generous, complementary, etc. That is what we are called to be as Christians! We are not guaranteed happiness, but it is not hard to find joy when you are full of gratitude.

I try to write a small list of things I am grateful for in my journal; you do not have to do this. The practice of making a list, however, is helpful when you have a bad day, to look back and be reminded of the blessings in your day. I hope you will consider a practice of gratitude for a week or a month and see how it impacts all the negatives in the world around us all.

May the Lord bless you and keep until we meet again.

HOW DO I CHOOSE?

At CTC we support many different Missions through "Special Offerings" including One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost/Strengthening the Church, Peace & Global Witness/Neighbors in Need and Christmas Joy/Fund as well as our "Missions of the Month" throughout the year.

It is not necessary to contribute to each of the Mission's CTC supports. If you are able and wish to do so, we invite you to select those missions you are most passionate about and donate to them. Any contributions you make are greatly appreciated. **THANK YOU**.

### PER CAPITA DONATIONS

As church members we are reminded annually that we must pay a per capita tax to our denomination. This money usually goes toward paying expenses at the higher level than our own immediate church. Since we are a two-denomination church (Presbyterian and United Church of Christ), we receive two bills for per capita. The denominations base the total per capita on the number of members that the church reports. Also, please bear in mind that since we are two denominations, all of our membership statistics that are submitted to the two denominations annually are divided in half. For instance, if we have 100 members, the report to each denomination will be 50 members. The Presbytery bill for us covers 50 members, so it is actually to our benefit. We also receive a bill for a lesser amount from UCC based on 50 members.

With this in mind, the Session has approved a request to be made to the members to pay \$30.00 per capita for 2025. Just a gentle reminder that the per capita is per member, not per household. So, if you have four people in your household that are members of Countryside Church, you are asked to pay for all four people a total of \$120.00. In order to defray the expense of the per capita, the Session is asking that members assist the church by paying their own per capita of \$30.00/member for 2025. We do not want to put a hardship on anyone, but these bills must be paid whether our treasury gets help from the members or not. There will be an envelope marked "per capita" in your box of contribution envelopes that you will be receiving in the next few weeks that you can use.
