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From Our Pastor:

One of the songs my mom sang to me often, when I was a little girl, was: "You are my sunshine." I sang that song to my children, and to my grandchildren. And I still often sing it to myself. But sometimes it is hard. Like today when it is raining. When I woke up at 5:00 am and couldn't go back to sleep. When I dropped my breakfast and so not only didn't have breakfast, but had to spend time cleaning up the mess. My morning is not going well. And yet, *You are my sunshine*, keeps ringing in my ears. And I think that is a good thing! Because, no matter how the day is going, there is always sunshine, even if and when we can't see it.

Easter will be here soon! Easter is such a joyous day! But in order to celebrate Easter, we must travel through Lent, and especially Holy Week. 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YOUR SESSION/COUNCIL AT WORK March 20, 2022 MARY ANN PARKER, CLERK OF SESSION

Following prayer by Pastor Jane Lynn Young reports were received.

Minutes of the last month's session meetings, stated and called, were approved.

Clerk's Report:

Church membership is now 113 with the deaths of Garth Westendorf and Ruth Marsh. We welcome John Van Arsdale into our membership. John transferred from Warren Avenue Presbyterian.

Communion was served to 31 parishioners on 3-6-2022.

Correspondence shared with session members.

Pastor's Report:

Pastor Jane will be in the church office Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Because of the cost of gas at this time she reported that she will be working from home on the third day. She did remind session that she would be available for phone calls, etc. if needed.

Denominational Reports: Roger Scovill served as elder commissioner at the Presbytery meeting on 3-5-2022 via ZOOM. He gave a brief report.

Pastor Nominating Committee Report: The Ministry Information Form was approved by session and will be sent to Linda Kennan, our liaison with Presbytery's Committee on Ministry and Ministry Preparation. This committee will review it and approve it. It can then be submitted to the Church Leadership website for matching with pastors who may be looking for a change of churches.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Building & Grounds: The loosening tapes on the steps coming into church at the east end will be repaired.

Christian Outreach: Kitty Blehm reported that the backpack program for the children at Weiss School will be packed every other Wednesday at 10 AM at the school.

The letter to be sent to absentee members was discussed.

Funds will be collected for assistance for Ukraine people and sent to those Presbyterian and UCC missions involved with that work.

Finance & Stewardship: Roger Scovill reported that the Stewardship campaign is now underway, and members will be receiving 3 letters in the next couple of months.

Spiritual Life: Pastor Jane is holding a Lenten Study group at 12 Noon on Wednesdays during the Lenten season. Bring your lunch and participate. The works of Van Gogh with scripture reference are enlightening and interesting. If you don't participate, you are missing out.

NEW BUSINESS: The BEAD Club will start to meet monthly on the fourth Tuesday in fellowship hall starting March 22nd.

Session decided that since the COVID numbers in Saginaw County are improving slightly that during the worship service we would ask congregants to do the following:

1. **Continue to mask.**
2. **Stand during the singing of hymns and prayers.**
3. **Encourage the use of hand sanitizer upon entering and exiting the church.**

Official Notice of Candidate for Conference Minister of the Michigan Conference UCC



Rev. Dr. Lillian Daniel

The Rev Dr. Lillian Daniel Lillian Daniel is a nationally recognized preacher, teacher and writer who cares deeply about clergy and congregations. After serving four unique congregations in the UCC, she now feels called by the Holy Spirit to leadership as the next Conference Minister of Michigan. A graduate of Yale Divinity School, she began her ministry as an Associate Pastor at a large church in Cheshire, Connecticut. From there she became a Solo Pastor at a small urban church in New Haven, Connecticut where the choir outnumbered the congregation, but over eight years, they grew to become a vibrant, interracial, community, that also became Open and Affirming. This would be the first of three churches to go through the Open and Affirming process under her pastoral leadership, which also includes extensive experience organizing for justice in politically diverse settings, serving on the boards of Interfaith Worker Justice and the Community Renewal Society. After ten years as a Senior Pastor at a large church in the western suburbs of Chicago, she moved to the beautiful driftless region of Dubuque, Iowa, where she has been Senior Pastor at an historic urban church since 2016. In the United Church of Christ, she has the distinction of having been a General Synod delegate from all of the three conferences she has served: Connecticut, Illinois and Iowa. A regular writer for the UCC Stillspeaking Devotionals, she was a founding member of the UCC Writer's Group that has produced many written materials for the denomination and in Iowa, she is currently a member of her association's Committee on Ministry. Lillian Daniel is also a widely read author whose latest book, *Tired of Apologizing for a Church I Don't Belong To* generated international conversation about the changing religious landscape. It continues the theme of her 2013 book *When 'Spiritual But Not Religious' Is Not Enough* about the growing number of people who claim "none" as their religious preference. Featured in the New York Times and on PBS, Lillian Daniel's writing has been described as "biting, hilarious, pitch perfect, tender, and often stunningly beautiful," and her book




This Odd and Wondrous Calling is taught in many seminaries. Passionate about faith formation for both clergy and laity, Lillian Daniel currently teaches UCC History and Polity at Chicago Theological Seminary where she is also on the Board of Trustees. She has taught preaching at a number of schools, including University of Chicago, University of Dubuque Theological Seminary and Yale Divinity School, although she can't be held responsible for everyone who falls asleep in church. Perhaps most importantly, at every church she has served, numerous church members and seminarians have felt the call to become pastors and they now serve at churches across the world. Lillian Daniel has spoken at the National Cathedral, Duke Chapel, King's College, London and Queen's College, Ontario, and now she looks forward to speaking at UCC churches across the Michigan Conference, with a focus on communication, connection, and celebration, as together we discern what our still speaking God is calling us to do next.

Per Capita Contributions continue to be collected: We are continuing to collect the Per Capita contributions. Again this year, we are inviting all members to contribute \$30 to cover the costs of providing support to "Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) of the United Church of Christ and the "Per Capita Offering" of the PC(USA). This donation empowers the Presbytery of Lake Huron, the Michigan Conference, and our denominations to provide us with guidance and support as we seek to carry out the work of Jesus Christ in our community and in our world. A fuller description is below:

PER CAPITA FOR 2022

As church members we are reminded annually that we must pay a per capita tax to our denomination. This money usually goes toward paying expenses at the higher level than our own immediate church. Since we are a two-denomination church (Presbyterian and United Church of Christ), we receive two bills for per capita. The denominations base the total per capita on the number of members that the church reports. Also, please bear in mind that since we are two denominations, all our membership statistics that are submitted to the two denominations annually are divided in half. For instance, if we have 100 members, the report to each denomination will be 50 members. The Presbytery bill for us covers 50 members, so it is actually to our benefit. We also receive a bill for a lesser amount from UCC based on 50 members.

With this in mind, the Session has approved a request to be made to the members to pay \$30.00 for the per capita for 2022. Just a gentle reminder that the per capita is per member, not per household. So, if you have four people in your household that are members of Countryside Church, you are asked to pay for all four people a total of \$120.00. In order to defray the expense of the per capita, the Session is asking that members assist the church by paying their own per capita of \$30.00/member for 2022. We do not want to put a hardship on anyone, but these bills must be paid whether our treasury gets help from the members or not. There will be an envelope marked "per capita" in your box of contribution envelopes that you will be receiving in the next few weeks that you can use.

The Session appreciates your help in this matter.


